FIJIAN COMPETITION AND CONSUMER COMMISSION ACT 2010

**Fijian Competition and Consumer Commission
(Price Control) (Petroleum Prices) Order 2024**

IN exercise of the powers conferred on it by sections 44 and 51 of the Fijian Competition and Consumer Commission Act 2010, the Fijian Competition and Consumer Commission, with the approval of the Minister, hereby makes this Order—

Short title and commencement

1.—(1) This Order may be cited as the Fijian Competition and Consumer Commission (Price Control) (Petroleum Prices) Order 2024.

(2) This Order comes into force on 1 February 2024.

Interpretation

2. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“Bulk Sale” means the sale of the goods specified in the schedules where the goods sold in a single transaction exceed a truck load;

“Drum Sale” means the sale of the goods specified in the schedules where the goods sold are safely stored in industrial drums;

“VAT” means the value added tax;

“VEP” means the price exclusive of VAT; and

“VIP” means the price inclusive of VAT.

Maximum prices

3.—(1) Subject to paragraph (2), the prices set out in schedules 1 to 6 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods mentioned therein may be sold in the areas so specified in the schedules.

(2) Where the maximum price of an item listed in the schedules is required to be rounded up to the nearest whole number at the point of sale by reason of the cessation of the 1 cent and 2 cents denominations, the consequential increase in the price of that item does not constitute a contravention of this order.

Schedule 1

4. The prices set out in Schedule 1 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods specified in it may be sold in any area on the island of Viti Levu located within 3 kilometres from any public road.

Schedule 2

5. The prices set out in Schedule 2 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods specified in it may be sold in any area on the island of Viti Levu located beyond 3 kilometres from any public road.

Schedule 3

6. The prices set out in Schedule 3 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods specified in it may be sold in any area on the islands of Vanua Levu and Ovalau located within 3 kilometres from any public road.

Schedule 4

7. The prices set out in Schedule 4 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods specified in it may be sold in any area on the islands of Vanua Levu and Ovalau located beyond 3 kilometres from any public road.

Schedule 5

8. The prices set out in Schedule 5 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods specified in it may be sold in any area within the Republic of Fiji other than the islands mentioned in schedules 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6.

Schedule 6

9. The prices set out in Schedule 6 are the maximum retail or wholesale prices, as the case may be, at which the goods specified in it may be sold in any area on the island of Rotuma.

Packaging

10. Except where otherwise stated, the prices referred to in order 3 include the cost of packaging.

Prices to be marked or displayed

11.—(1) Any person selling by retail any of the goods specified in any of the schedules must cause the same to be legibly and conspicuously marked with the maximum retail price for the information of the public.

(2) If goods specified in any of the schedules are not displayed for sale in individual packets or containers, a retailer complies with this order if the retailer displays in a prominent position a legible and conspicuous notice clearly indicating those goods to which the notice relates and the maximum retail price of the goods.

Calculation of price

12. If the maximum price ascertained in any of the schedules includes a fraction of a cent, an amount of or in excess of one half ($\frac{1}{2}$) cent is to be reckoned as one cent and an amount of less than one half ($\frac{1}{2}$) cent is to be ignored.

VAT

13. Wholesalers must state VAT separately in the invoice provided at the time of sale.

Revocation

14. The Fijian Competition and Consumer Commission (Price Control) (Petroleum Prices) (No. 12) Order 2023 is revoked.

Short title and commencement

1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Real Estate Agents (Fees, Forms and Appeals) (Amendment) Regulations 2024.

(2) These Regulations come into force on 1 February 2024.

(3) In these Regulations, the Real Estate Agents (Fees, Forms and Appeals) Regulations 2008 is referred to as the “Principal Regulations”.

Regulation 1 amended

2. Regulation 1 of the Principal Regulations is amended by deleting “Agent” and substituting “Agents”.

Regulation 2A deleted

3. The Principal Regulations is amended by deleting regulation 2A.

TERTIARY SCHOLARSHIPS AND LOANS SERVICE ACT 2014

Tertiary Scholarships Schemes (Amendment) Regulations 2024

IN exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 25(1) of the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service Act 2014 and on the recommendation of the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service, I hereby make these Regulations—

Short title and commencement

1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Tertiary Scholarships Schemes (Amendment) Regulations 2024.

(2) These Regulations come into force on the date of publication in the Gazette.

(3) In these Regulations, the Tertiary Scholarships Schemes Regulations 2022 is referred to as the “Principal Regulations”.

Regulation 2 amended

2. Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations is amended by—

(a) in the definition of “priority area”, deleting “and for the National Toppers Scholarship Scheme.”; and

(b) deleting the definition of “Scheme” and substituting the following—

““Scheme” means the Higher Education (Level 7) with minimum cut off Mark Scheme, In-service Scheme, Masters and PhDs by Research Scheme, Merit Based Higher Education – Level 7 Local Scheme, Merit Based Overseas Scheme, Merit Based Skills Qualification Scheme, Students with Special Needs Scheme, Skills Qualification Based on Offer Letter Scheme, or Tuition Only Hardship Assistance Scheme; and”.

Regulation 5 amended

3. Regulation 5 of the Principal Regulations is amended by deleting subregulation (4) and substituting the following—

“(4) An application made under this regulation for a Scheme must be made in accordance with the requirements outlined in Schedule 5.”.

Regulation 7 amended

4. Regulation 7 of the Principal Regulations is amended by—

- (a) deleting “provisional” wherever it appears; and
- (b) in subregulation (1), deleting “A” and substituting “An”.

Regulation 8 amended

5. Regulation 8 of the Principal Regulations is amended by—

- (a) deleting “7” wherever it appears and substituting “3”; and
- (b) deleting “provisional” wherever it appears.

Regulation 10 amended

6. Regulation 10(1) of the Principal Regulations is amended by deleting “program” and substituting “programme”.

Regulation 11 amended

7. The Principal Regulations are amended by deleting regulation 11 and substituting the following—

“Scholarship privileges

11. The scholarship privileges are outlined in Schedule 7 as follows—

- (a) for Masters and PhDs by Research Scheme, in Part A;
- (b) for Merit Based Overseas Scheme, in Part B;
- (c) for Merit Based Higher Education – Level 7 Local Scheme, in Part C;
- (d) for Higher Education (Level 7) with minimum cut off Mark Scheme, in Part D;
- (e) for Merit Based Skills Qualification Scheme, in Part D;
- (f) for Students with Special Needs Scheme, in Part D;
- (g) for Skills Qualification Based on Offer Letter Scheme, in Part D;
- (h) for In-service Scheme, in Part E; and
- (i) for Tuition Only Hardship Assistance Scheme, in Part F.”.

Regulation 14 amended

8. Regulation 14 of the Principal Regulations is amended by deleting “where applicable, Schedule 9” and substituting “the terms and conditions of the Schemes offer letter and bond.”.

Regulation 15 amended

9. Regulation 15 of the Principal Regulations is amended by—

(a) deleting subregulation (1) and substituting the following—

“(1) Any academic or disciplinary action taken by an eligible institution on a student may result in a parallel action by the Service in terms of sponsorship after—

(a) the eligible institution has notified the Service about the academic or disciplinary action; and

(b) the eligible institution has submitted an investigative report on the academic or disciplinary action, to the Service.”; and

(b) in subregulation (2)(b), deleting “1” and substituting “one”.

- (c) have completed and passed at least Year 13 Examination in 2023 with a minimum score of 250/400 or 240/400 if from rural and maritime school or equivalent as determined by the Service. An applicant who has completed Foundation studies and repeats Year 13 is not eligible to apply for the Scheme or;
- (d) have completed and passed at least Year 12 Examination in 2023 with a minimum score of 270/400 or 260/400 if from rural and maritime school or equivalent as determined by the Service; and
- (e) secure a place at an eligible institution by means of a final offer letter.

- (f) secure a place at an eligible institution by means of a final offer letter.

8. Scholarships for Skills Qualification Based on Offer Letter Scheme

An applicant must—

- (a) be a citizen of Fiji;
- (b) be ordinarily resident in Fiji for at least 3 years before the award commencement date, unless determined by the Service or delegated authority on a case-by-case basis;
- (c) secure a final offer letter from an eligible higher education institution for either Certificate Level III, IV and Diploma Levels 5 and 6 programmes; and
- (d) not have a combined parental income or business net worth of more than \$100,000 unless allowed by means testing.

9. Scholarships for Tuition Only Hardship Assistance Scheme

An applicant must—

- (a) be a citizen of Fiji;

- (b) be ordinarily resident in Fiji for at least 3 years before the award commencement date, unless determined by the Service or delegated authority on a case-by-case basis;
- (c) be a second or third year student with cumulative GPA equivalent to 65% of the total grade point. The Service must make a case by case decision on the real hardship for students below 65% GPA;
- (d) be enrolled for a Higher Education Level 7 programme at an eligible higher education institution;
- (e) submit programme audit clearly indicating successful completion of one year of studies as per full load requirement; and
- (f) not have a combined parental income or business net worth of more than \$100,000 unless allowed by means testing.”.

 - (f) hostel fee (if staying on-campus);
 - (g) establishment allowance (one-off payment at the beginning of the programme) at a maximum rate of AUD or NZD \$3,500;
 - (h) return airfare (at the beginning and end of the programme – Economy class);
 - (i) book allowance at a maximum rate of AUD or NZD \$2,000 per annum; and
 - (j) excess baggage allowance at a maximum rate of AUD or NZD \$300.
2. The Service may review the scholarship cover under paragraph (1) and make such changes as may be required.

C. For Merit Based Local Scholarships

1. The scholarship covers the following expenses for the eligible course only—
 - (a) tuition fee;
 - (b) any general service fee; and
 - (c) allowance of \$3,400 per semester and pro-rata for quarter and trimester.
2. The Service may review the scholarship cover under paragraph 1 and make such changes as may be required.

D. For Other Scholarships

1. The scholarship covers the following expenses for the eligible course only—
 - (a) tuition fee;
 - (b) allowance of \$2,500 per semester and pro-rata for quarter and trimester for away campus; and
 - (c) allowance of \$1,500 per semester and pro-rata for quarter and trimester for home campus.
2. The Service may review the scholarship cover under paragraph 1 and make such changes as may be required.

E. For In-service Scholarships

1. The scholarship will only cover the tuition fee for an eligible course.
2. The Service may review the scholarship under paragraph (1) and make such changes as may be required.

F. For Tuition Only Hardship Assistance Scholarships

1. The scholarship will only cover the tuition fee for any eligible course.
2. The Service may review the scholarship cover under paragraph 1 and make such changes as may be required.”.

TERTIARY SCHOLARSHIPS AND LOANS SERVICE ACT 2014

Tertiary Education Loans Schemes (Amendment) Regulations 2024

IN exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 25(1) of the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service Act 2014 and on the recommendation of the Tertiary Scholarships and Loans Service, I hereby make these Regulations—

Short title and commencement

1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Tertiary Education Loans Schemes (Amendment) Regulations 2024.

(2) These Regulations come into force on the date of publication in the Gazette.

(3) In these Regulations, the Tertiary Education Loans Schemes Regulations 2022 is referred to as the “Principal Regulations”.

Scheme Application Requirements

1. A student who intends to apply for a study loan under a Scheme must apply using the Service’s online application portal, unless exempted by the Service.
2. An application must be submitted to the Service by the application closing date as advertised for each new academic term or academic year.
3. All important dates in relation to applications for each academic term or year must be published on the Service’s website and official social media pages.
4. A student must submit all the required documents as specified in the application advertisement.

Loan Scheme for In-Service Students

Scheme Eligibility Criteria

An applicant must:

- (a) be a Fiji citizen;

- (b) be ordinarily resident in Fiji for at least 3 years before the award commencement date, unless determined by the Service or delegated authority on a case-by-case basis;
- (c) be in employment or provide evidence of self-employment in business at the time of application and remain in employment during the course of studies, unless on leave with or without pay;
- (d) be seeking to attain a first higher education academic qualification or upgrade an existing qualification in the same area, only if the earlier qualification was not funded by the Service up to his or her first Bachelor's Degree;
- (e) provide a support letter from the employer on the identified areas of employment;
- (f) secure a place at an eligible institution by means of a final offer letter; and
- (g) be paid tuition only.”.
